Getting into the Swing of Things...

Still a few problems with the organisation of the event: technical issues delayed the publication of individual pairings, and incorrect board order when they did go up leading to preparation against the wrong opponent for example. This was not well communicated; I noticed a banner on chess-results asking captains to resubmit teams, but it was easy to miss!

We are however starting to establish a routine, with a rota for coaching sessions, understanding the meal times, and a much more reasonable schedule of bus transfers. The bus to the venue now leaves at 1:30pm and is scheduled to return every half-hour from 5pm onwards rather than making everyone wait for a full bus first. At least that's the theory; it was only due to Olivia's putting her foot down firmly that the 7:30pm bus left on time after the round. The driver wanted to hang on until 8pm. Taking his name and the implied threat to report him worked a treat – well done Olivia. That extra half hour is *really valuable* time in the evenings for going through games, not to mention eating etc..

Round 2

Women's Team

Wales Women had black on the odd boards against Greece (2 blacks in a row – must be due White tomorrow!). Playing on board 17, above Uzbekistan-Russia (board 19) and China-Colombia (board 20) the team had the opportunity to see some of the top teams' games.



Before the round, the team also witnessed the marriage proposal by Indian journalist **Niklesh Jain** to Colombian player WIM **Angela Franco Valencia** – which she accepted, much to the delight of everyone nearby.

Co-incidentally, we now know that Wales will be playing Colombia in Round 3: Angela will be Shayanna's opponent, on board 4.

Back to the chess... out-rated by an average of 315 points per board, things went much as expected. Would have been great to squeeze out a draw or two, but it wasn't to be.

Batumi Mall has entertainment on the top floor including a petting zoo, "12D" cinema (looked like a simulator ride) and amusement arcade; a supermarket and food outlets on the ground floor; and fashion and homeware on 1 and 2.

All the stores were local brands or designer "vintage" outlets – none of the Western shops ubiquitous to every

shopping centre in the UK – and everything at very good prices, less than a third of what we'd expect to pay in the UK. We bought some clothes! Afterwards we had Spicy Italian subs and cookies from Subway, as we'd missed the hotel lunch. Made a nice change ②.

Meanwhile in playing hall 2, the Wales Open team were against the very under-rated Swaziland. That's the trouble when nations have few opportunities to play rated games outside their own country: Francis's opponent was a junior, whose only rated games have been in Swaziland, many against other juniors. He played well and held on for a draw, nonetheless giving our team a 3½ - ½ victory.

An interesting fact about Swaziland: earlier this year, King Mswati III of Swaziland changed his country's name to **eSwatini**. The new name, which the king announced at celebrations of the 50th anniversary of the country's independence from Britain and his own 50th birthday, means "land of the Swazis" in the local language. The team's Olympiad kit reflects the new name of the country.

Carl had a rest day and spent most of it properly resting. He's had the worst of the jet lag it seems. Hopefully he will be fully recovered for round 3, when we meet New Zealand.

Other Notable Results

There were a few upsets in the Women's section this round, most notably:

- A 2-2 draw by Georgia 3 (seeded 56) v Germany (seeded 9)
- A 2-2 draw by South Korea (seeded 77) v Brazil (seeded 7). Brazil out-rated S Korea by an average of 230 points!

In the Open section, there were a couple of impressive individual results from Ireland against 2nd seed Russia on table 2:

- GM Alexander Baburin 2452 drew with Russian GM Sergey Karjakin 2760
- IM David Fitzsimons 2316 drew with GM Dimitry Jakovenko 2747


Looking Forward
